Attendees will learn how the SRC helped to demystify the scholarship application process, create a culture of philanthropy on campus, teach students the importance of giving back and expressing gratitude, build partnerships with campus and external partners through workshops, events, and social media engagement; and create an interactive space for donors to engage with us and learn more about the impact of their giving. Even in the midst of Free Community College for All, the SRC continues to be a space where students can gain access to supports and funding that ensures they make it to the finish line.

The 18-month process not only clarified those priorities, but resulted in a more engaged board of directors that remains focused on what matters most -- and that led to the launch of new student programs and services that are positively impact the student experience every day.

Driving Change with Every Gift: An Innovative and Inclusive Giving Campaign with Serious Impact

In 2020, Holyoke Community College launched a campaign titled, "TogetherHCC," which was aimed at providing support (financial and otherwise) to students during the global pandemic. Since then, TogetherHCC Drive to Change Lives has continued as a 24-hour giving campaign aimed at not only raising funds, but galvanizing the entire community around the importance of community college and the impact of gifts of all sizes. The campaign just wrapped-up its sixth year, bringing in 504 donors in one day and raising a nearly \$1 million, cumulatively, since the campaign's inception. Beyond fundraising impact, the TogetherHCC has created virtual space for all members of the community to gain inspiration and feel included, and when this happens, the impact on our students is extraordinary.

This presentation highlights an innovative place-based learning initiative at Bunker Hill Community College (BHCC), focused on engaging students with the Charlestown, Chinatown, and Chelsea neighborhoods. By embedding community assets into our sociology curriculum, this initiative fosters meaningful connections between students and their local community environments. Through partnerships with community organizations, students participate in activities such as site visits, local events, and community service, enhancing their sociological understanding and civic awareness. This project aims not only to strengthen students' academic and personal growth but also to build lasting connections between BHCC and these communities. The presentation will share key insights, outcomes, and challenges from the pilot phases, demonstrating how place-based learning can be a powerful tool for student engagement and community empowerment.
