On Thursday, October 11, 2018, Fall River has entered the national spotlight. Not for anything good. Our city has become a national disgrace because on October 11, our Mayor Jasiel F. Correia II was charged with 13 federal counts of defrauding investors and for filing false tax returns. The story has also received more national attention because the mayor has added fuel to the fire and has made a mockery of the situation, and the city by coming out of court after being arraigned laughing, stating that this is "not my best Thursday" after speaking to reporters.

Will we receive more state and federal funding to help improve our city? We will not.

In both the 2015 and 2017 municipal preliminary elections, the mayor did come in first place, however the victories were only pluralities and the mayor failed to receive 50 percent of the vote.

SINGLE MOTHERS STRIVE FOR EDUCATION

Students here at Bristol Community College have the same goal in life, getting a degree. Getting a degree is not that simple for some students that are single parents. The students who are parents may work full time, go to class full time or part time whether it is morning or night classes, and have to juggle being a single mother with support or no support. Here at Bristol Community College there is a daycare. They are able to register the child, if they are between the ages of nine months till about six years old.

Haley Rego, a young girl from Swansea was just 18 years old when she first got pregnant. At the time of her first child, she got her GED diploma a month after dropping out of high school. Life for Rego was not all that perfect, as everyone around her thought. Rego had little support from the child's father and had to get state assistance. Then it dawned on her that going back to school was the best option for her and her child. "I picked day classes at Bristol Community College. My major was dentistry because my daughter went to daycare on campus. After being at school all day, I would go to work at night as a waitress," said Rego. Rego had also mentioned that, even though her professors had no sympathy for her being a mother, she did not care.

She got pregnant again at 20 years old during the last semester of college. Rego said "a couple months after I gave birth, I went back to school and I did my clinicals." Regardless of the age she had both her daughters, giving them both a great life was her motivation.

A single mother Breana Couto knows what that is like. As a single mother of a now eight-month-old little girl, full-time student, plus working, and with no help from any of the father's side, it is hard. "Although I know school is important, my child will always come first, whether it be nighttime cuddles over studying, she will always be my first priority" said Couto. Couto had found out she was expecting when she had just finished the prerequisites for her nursing program.

Couto takes a mixture of times for her classes. She added that her professors did not care about them being parents. If her child was sick or there was an emergency, her professors could have cared any less, as if it was such an inconvenience to them. "My mother helps out as much as she can and I put her in daycare," Couto said. She said she was going to school for herself, but now that she is a single mother, that all changes. She is going to school because in the long run, it will benefit their life more.

Although being a single parent is difficult at some times with school, at the end of the day, it is worth it. "No matter how stressful the school life will get, my daughters will have a better life than I did," said Rego. If both Breana Couto and Haley Rego can be single mothers, go to school, work, and pick up their children from daycare, it is possible that any single mother can do it.

one is on Wednesday, November 14 at 11 a.m. with Gia Sanchez, who is the title IX officer for the college.

Currently the hours for the center are Monday - Wednesday, 9:30 a.m. - 3:30 p.m., "with hopes of more hours in the future," said Brito. The services provided will be "firstmost to have students come in and feel comfortable," Brito stressed.

According to Brito, data was collected before the center was open on what type of services would be desired by women. By overwhelming responses, students wanted to have a place that they would feel "safe and supported," Brito said.

With these goals in mind, there is a study area for students to help them with their studies and also a lending library for students to borrow books on women's issues and subjects. Pamphlets are also available of various resources for students in need. The women's center also has a book club that is centered around women issues in some way.

Also, the women's center provides female students with an opportunity to get professional clothes that they might need for an interview and will also be providing a women's circle that students can come and talk about different issues that are affecting them. In addition, the center is located next to the nurse's room, and they will provide a lactation room for students that might be nursing.

Brito also stated she would love to hear from other students on how the center would be useful, and she also welcomes the idea of professors inviting her to their class to talk about the women's center. Assassin's Creed Odyssey Review

Assassin's Creed Odyssey is an open world filled with action and adventure. The game first takes you to Thermopylae where King Leonidas briefs his soldiers, then prepares for battle. The battle commences and ends with you defeating a Persian brute. The graphics are amazing in this game from jumping in the water, the Greek landscape, and the character expressions. In the game, when you take a dive in the water, you can see how realistic it gets from the water appearing on the screen. The landscape brings you back to that period with statues and temples of different gods and goddesses.

When you first start the game with your assassins, there is an enormous statue of Zeus sitting atop the Kephallonia Islands. The mountains and ports provide a glimpse of what the terrain was at that time in Ancient Greece and how it was mostly hilly with more civilization as in cities or towns near the ports. The character expressions in this game are also great because you can tell when your character is mad or confused without saying a word.

The game lets you choose your own decisions, with there being no wrong answers, but there will be consequences for every decision you make. So, you can either have a conscience, be more of a romantic character, or be a murderer. The character's decisions affect the world around you, as quests can appear due to your deeds. In these quests, side characters can live and die. For example, I was trying to protect a side character, but I failed to protect him, even when I was trying to, and he ended up dying.

The other game mechanics show the level of difficulty. Controls, sound and music are also nice and new. The level of difficulty has four difficulty settings

with them being easy, normal, hard, and nightmare. I went with easy because I want to get adjusted to the game first before I switched to a harder difficulty setting. The game has two kinds of controls with one being default and the other being alternate. I chose the default settings, as I think it would be easier to figure out for now. The sound and music are great, as it clearly goes well with the concept of Ancient greece and the campaign.

The game has a vast assortment of armor and weapons with the ability to engrave your weapons, which will upgrade your perks. I have had some of my weapons and armor engraved, and it lists the perks such as four to assassin damage, four to warrior damage, and so on. It also has different kinds of abilities which include venomous attacks, Sparta kick, bull rush, and many more. One of the abilities I have is bull rush, where you can shove yourself at an enemy, and it can inflict some damage. The different abilities can either slightly hurt an enemy or hurt an enemy bad depending on how strong they are as fighters.

All in all, Assassin's Creed is the great upcoming game to buy this week. The game has good graphics and a good plot. For history people, such as myself, I think this game will suit you. I would recommend getting the original game to save some money.

The series is published by Ubisoft with the developer being Ubisoft Montreal. Assassin's Creed Odyssey can be bought from GameStop, Walmart, Target, and even online from companies such as Amazon or eBay. If you want to preorder it, your best bet is to go to GameStop because at GameStop, you can get power up rewards. This helps lower the price of the game.

The game at GameStop also comes with more editions of the game such as the Steelbook Edition, the Ultimate Edition, Gold Edition, Deluxe Edition, and the Original game. The Steelbook Edition of Assassin's Creed Odyssey costs \$109.99, the Deluxe Edition costs \$79.99, the Ultimate Edition costs \$119.99, the Gold Edition costs \$99.99 and the original game costs \$59.99. The Steelbook Edition comes with two season passes and a preorder mission, the Ultimate Edition comes with Kronos Gear Pack, Herald of Dusk Gear Pack, Capricornus Gear Pack, and some online boosts.



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
