**Anatomy of a Genocide: The Life and Death of a Town Called Buczacz** - Omer Bartov, Professor of History, Brown University

**Description:**

Omer Bartov was born in [Israel](#) and attended [Tel Aviv University](#) and [St. Antony's College, Oxford](#). As a historian, Bartov is most noted for his studies of the German Army in World War II. Bartov has challenged the popular view that the German Army was an apolitical force that had little involvement in war crimes or crimes against humanity in World War II. Bartov has argued that the [Wehrmacht](#) was a deeply Nazi institution that played a key role in the [Holocaust](#) in the occupied areas of the Soviet Union.

**Description:**

Henry Greenspan is a psychologist and playwright at the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor who has been writing and teaching about the Holocaust for almost three decades. He is the author of *On Listening to Holocaust Survivors: Beyond Testimony*, and *Reflections: Auschwitz, Memory, and a Life Recreated*, as well as the acclaimed play *Remnants*. He received his B.A. and M.Ed. from Harvard University and his Ph.D. from Brandeis University.

**Description:**

(The T4 Program, also called T4 Euthanasia Program, was a Nazi Germany effort - framed as a euthanasia program - to kill incurably ill, physically or mentally disabled, emotionally distraught, and elderly people)

Michael Alan Grodin, is a Professor of Health Law, Ethics and Human Rights at the Boston University School of Public Health and a Professor in the Center for Health Law, Ethics & Human Rights, where he has received the two highest awards granted the Faculty, the Career Research and Scholarship Award and the Norman A. Scotch Award for Excellence in Teaching. In addition, Dr. Grodin is Director of the Project on Medicine and the Holocaust at the Elie Wiesel Center for Judaic Studies, core faculty of Judaic Studies and a member of the Division of Religious Studies of the College of Arts and Sciences. He completed his B.S. degree at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, his M.D. degree at the Albert Einstein College of Medicine, his postdoctoral and fellowship training at UCLA and Harvard, and he has been on the faculty of Boston University for the past 34 years.
